#### Natural Resources Completes Major Restoration Project

The Nooksack Natural Resources Department recently finished the last phase of the North Fork Nooksack River, Wildcat Reach Restoration Project. The three phases of this project included 83 individual log jams on over a mile of the North Fork. This project and all of the habitat restoration work on the North Fork is part of the Department's efforts to restore stable side channel spawning habitat to increase natural production of Chinook and other salmonids for sustainable Tribal harvest.

The Wildcat project is described by our engineer as "a really cool project and probably a first at this scale using Engineered Log Jams this broadly." Each phase had its challenges and were equally met by the ambitious, creative and hard working Natural Resource team. Several of the staff members have been involved in all three phases, bringing their skills and experience from prior phases to efficiently complete this project that is vital to the return of salmon on the North Fork Nooksack.

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Natural Resources also welcomed the addition of Arin Smith, the new crew lead, who, under the guidance of Sindick Bura and Darren Malloway, quickly learned the techniques most important in supporting these construction projects, including harvesting and salvaging native plants, cutting and tying cable, and planting each log jam and the disturbed areas with native conifers and shrubs.

Natural Resources is excited to continue our work on both the North and South Forks of the Nooksack by improving salmon habitat and salmon spawning opportunities through log jam construction and restoring natural function along the river corridors.

## **Tribal Departments Trained on Providing Wraparound Services**

More than 35 Tribal employees recently came together to learn, discuss, and challenge each other to provide coordinated wraparound services to Nooksack families.

Although there is a commitment throughout the Tribe to provide the most effective holistic services to the Nooksack community possible, this was the first time that so many Nooksack employees could come together to be formally trained in the principles of wraparound. The central idea of wraparound services is that clients have multiple and complex needs. No matter how well any one program or one provider works with them, their needs are too great to be served effectively. The solution then is for multiple providers from different programs to work together using a formal structured process to offer coordinated wraparound services.

Deborah Painte and Sandra Bercier of the Native American Training Institute flew in from North Dakota to offer this training at the Suchanon Community Building. The audience included staff from Family Services, Health Clinic, Tribal Court, Office of the Tribal Attorney, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, Indian Child Welfare, Child Support, Elders, Nooksack Tribal Police, Genesis II, Education and Vocational Rehab. The group also included representatives from the Federal Region 10 Administration for Children and Families Office, Northwest Regional Council and the Nooksack Valley School District. One of the trainers said this was the most diverse audience they've ever had for a wraparound training.

The training provided gave the group so much to think about. Coming together also committed the many departments to changing the way we work and bodes well for the future in providing the best wraparound services for our Tribal families and members. #### Behavioral Health Partners With Head Start To Offer Early Head Smarts



Early Heart Smarts is an exciting, evidence-based curriculum approved for children ages three to six that we offer through a partnership between our Education Department and Behavioral Health. Within these ages, children are naturally heart-centered and eager to learn! Early Heart Smarts uses games, music, teddy bear and storybooks to teach about the physical and emotional heart. Children learn to identify and understand the variety of emotions they experience in themselves and others. They practice expression and experience of positive emotion for family and friends. Children also learn problem-solving and to remain stable to cope with difficult emotions in a healthy way.

Why is this important? When children learn to develop emotional language and able to express emotions appropriately then they can take responsibility for their feelings and behaviors. Developing social and emotional skills allows children to improve focus and concentration at the school. Increasing focus and concentration give children a chance to learn educational material taught at the school. Graduating from school and having good grades leads to employment and breaking the cycle of poverty and unhealthy life. This curriculum also teaches how to show kindness and concern for others that leads to positive relationships within the family and especially with our Elders. Strengthening these skills open doors to learning traditional and cultural values by family and Tribal Elders. Learning problem-solving skills will help these children not to point fingers at each other and stay positive to solve problems and make smart choices for themselves and Nooksack Tribal Community. Confidence and self-awareness provides the strength to do the right thing instead of giving into negative peer pressure.

Born and raised in Wisconsin and Minnesota, Joseph Popelka got his start working with young people running a 21-day wilderness therapy intervention program for adolescent young men for the Minnesota Department of Corrections. He spent five years there also completed a master's degree at the University of Minnesota studying risk management in Wilderness Therapy Programs. He moved to the Pacific Northwest almost five years ago to attend Western Washington University's Master's in Mental Health Counseling Program. After graduating from this program, he accepted a job after an internship at Interfaith Community Health Center, where he worked as a Mental Health Counselor in the medical clinic as a crisis responder and in the Behavioral Healthcare division. He became a fully licensed mental health counselor in the State of Washington last year. In his spare time, he enjoys biking, hiking and swimming with his wife and 8-yearold daughter. Sara Andaluz has a master's degree in Mental Health Counseling, and is a licensed Mental Health Specialist.

Amanda Shannon is a licensed Marriage and Family Therapist, Child Mental Health Specialist, and Disability Mental Health Specialist. She runs the social and emotional groups for the afterschool/summer program and Head Start. Amanda also does school based counseling at Mt. Baker High School, Mt. Baker Junior High School and Acme Elementary School. She says that it's a pleasure to work with the Nooksack youth, parents, families, and individuals. She has been trained in various Evidence Based Practices and specializes in working with children, teens, families, and couples. Before becoming a counselor she worked or seven years as a teacher's assistant and long-term teacher substitute.



Hailee Strassner recently moved from Santa Fe, New Mexico, where she received her master's degree in Art Therapy/Counseling from Southwestern College. She has experience working with children and adults in both individual and group settings. As an art therapist, she has also been involved in mural painting, open art studios, horse therapy, and community garden projects.

As many of us know, making art has great healing abilities. Art Therapy is known to increase awareness of the self and others; help cope with symptoms, stress and traumatic experiences; improve brain function; and encourage pleasure of creating with the hands and heart. Since an art therapist is trained in both art and counseling, she is able to assess and treat mental health issue with a variety of tools and techniques.

#### Strengthening Families Program Comes to Nooksack

Nooksack Way of Life is in the process of bringing the Strengthening Families Program to the Nooksack Tribe from Jan. 22 to March 5.

The sessions will occur on Wednesday nights at the Sulwhanon Community Building. Dinner will start at 5:30 and separate classes for youth and parents will occur from 6 to 8 p.m.

The Strengthening Families Program (SFP) consists of special sessions that include information on science-based parenting, children's life, and family life training, specifically designed for families with preteen and teenagers. Parents, Elders, family members, and children participate in SFP, both separately and together. Each session is informative and offers several games, hands-on activities, and fun ice breakers for the groups to partake in.

Our Nooksack Way of Life Program is looking for 10 to 12 families who are open to learning positive healthy family interacting practices. Participants will meet for a shared meal; then the adults will break off from the youth for a one hour group session, with the final hour being for the two groups to unite and share fun handson activities together. The Nooksack Way of Life Team will have door prizes, giveaways, and the meal for free to all attending. Childcare for younger children will be available. The little ones will be engaged in games, arts and crafts activities and they can join the family for the final graduation ceremony.

### Using 911 services to improve public safety

Keeping our Tribal Members safe is one of our primary concerns. There's something very simple that you can do to protect yourself and your family, no matter where you are.

If you see anyone or anything out of the ordinary, call 911.

Examples of strange circumstances that would prompt a 911 call include seeing suspicious looking people who don't belong in your area; seeing someone who is looking in the windows of cars or homes; if something is stolen from our Tribal offices or your residence; if you see or experience a physical dispute; or basically anything else that's out of the ordinary.

Calling 911 for issues related to our Tribal lands ensures that whatever officers are available and closest to the area of concern can respond. The same is true for officers wherever you are.

There might be occasions where officers can't respond because of competing criminal priorities, but it's still just as important to call 911 and file that report.

These calls help our police departments gather information and statistics on where, and possibly how and why, crime is happening. That helps our police departments understand, for example, what areas might need to be patrolled more often, or a safety improvement could be as simple as improving lighting in a dark area.

But, no matter what the improvement is, if you don't call 911, the safety won't be enhanced.
