# Dear Nooksack Tribal Community, My Friends and Relatives,

I asking you for the opportunity to represent the interests of our community and future generations of Nooksack People. I am currently employed with the Whatcom County Library System in a role that does just that, an employee of the County Government who helps to provide services to the Nooksack Tribe Community in promoting access to literacy, thereby improving the quality of life for Indigenous People. I believe my experience in working within the Tribal government System as a Committee and Commission member will be an asset to the responsibilities of Tribal Council. I have served in Multiple seats on the Tribal Fish Commission over the course of the last 15 years. In 2019 I was appointed to be a member of the Nooksack Enrollment Committee, of which I serve as the Chairman, our goal is to revise and amend by-laws and ordinances and recommend policies and procedures to the Tribal Council and Administration. My life as a 4th generation commercial fisherman and passion for learning Lhéchelesem and preserving/practicing our fishing rights will help to preserve our economic and food sovereignty. My interest in this sort of responsibility began when I first picked up the book "THE RIGHTS OF INDIANS AND TRIBES: The Authoritative ACLU Guide to Indian Tribes and Rights" many years ago. I am also familiar with Water Law, Environmental Sciences and Civil Rights as they apply to Indian Tribes. I have spent a significant amount of time reading on these subjects as they are more of a personal fascination rather than a professional one.

The right to food sovereignty for Indigenous People is a fight for sustainability and independence, for the last three years I have been cultivating camas bulbs in my home garden and sharing the crops with other gardeners and working towards reintroducing this valuable food to local prairies where it was once most abundant.

The Nooksack People have a strong cultural heritage and identity, with a distinct language known as Nooksack, or Lhéchelesem. We face challenges in preserving and revitalizing our traditional language, which is endangered and sleeping. We have a history of internal conflicts and legal disputes over enrollment, leadership, and governance issues. I intend to address this with transparency and accountability through affirmative action. The tribe has limited financial resources and relies heavily on federal grants and contracts for funding. However, our membership of almost 2,000 people can be better enabled to increase our political and social influence and economic prosperity.

The Nooksack Indian Tribe can leverage its cultural and natural assets to attract tourism and generate revenue. The tribe can collaborate with other tribes, organizations, and agencies to enhance its capacity and access to resources. The tribe can explore new opportunities for economic development and diversification, such as renewable energy, agriculture, or technology. The tribe can invest in education and training programs to improve the skills and employability of its members and remove barriers to employment.

The Nooksack Indian Tribe faces external threats from environmental degradation, climate change, and natural disasters that affect its lands, waters, and resources. The tribe faces competition from other gaming and hospitality businesses in our region. We face potential legal and regulatory challenges from federal, state, and local authorities over our sovereignty, jurisdiction, and rights.

We face social and health issues such as poverty, unemployment, substance abuse, and chronic diseases among our relatives. I recognize these opportunities and challenges, and I am asking you, my friends and family to enable me to do something about it.
